- (c) How does Fielding meet the requirements of 'plot' and 'plotting' in his choice of incidents in *Tom Jones*. Give suitable illustrations from the text.
- (d) In what ways is the expression 'comic epic in prose' applicable to *Tom Jones*?
- 2. Answer any *one* of the following questions (within 300 words): 10×1
 - (a) "Dorothea's destiny is the result, not just of the narrowness of her provincial world, but also of her ardent, theoretic nature." Do you accept this view? State your reasons.
 - (b) Write a note on the narrative technique of Middlemarch.
 - (c) Show how class oppression and gender oppression run parallel in Tess.
 - (d) Would you like to consider Tess as 'a pure woman'?

- 3. Answer any *one* of the following questions (within 300 words): 10×1
 - (a) "Addison possessed a keen sense of humour and a remarkable insight into character."

 Discuss with special reference to at least two essays of Addison in the Coverley Papers.
 - (b) Would you agree with Dr. Johnson's remark in Life of Cowley that in metaphysical poetry "the most heterogeneous ideas are yoked by violence together"?
 - (c) Mary Wollstonecraft's A Vindication of the Rights of Woman is "a powerful plea for fundamental change in society's perception of the function, place and potential of women". Elucidate.
- **4.** Comment on any *two* of the following questions (each comment within 100 words): 5×2
 - (a) (i) The ending of Robinson Crusoe.

(ii) Description of a battle of the amorous kind between Tom Jones and Mrs. Waters.

(b) (i) The Dorothea-Ladislaw relationship.

Or

- (ii) The murder of Alec.
- (c) (i) Will Wimble as "the darling of the country".

(ii) Dr. Johnson's view of Cowley's delight in "confusion of images".
