 - (a) Show how Everyman departs from the tradition of a regular Morality play.
 - (b) Write a note on the art of characterization in *Everyman*.

- (c) Discuss Marlowe's handling of the theme of damnation in *Doctor Faustus*.
- (d) Examine how the dichotomy between the Good Angel and the Bad Angel is an embodiment of Faustus's own psyche.
- 2. Answer any one of the following within 300 words: 10
 - (a) In Volpone, Ben Jonson breaks his own rule that comedy should deal with 'follies, not with crimes'. Discuss.
 - (b) How is the opening speech in Volpone relevant to the entire action of the play?
 - (c) "No lovers lived so great, or died so well.' Who are the lovers? How far is this statement borne out by the action of the play in which the lovers appear?
 - (d) Examine how the role of Alexus makes All for Love different from Shakespeare's Antony and Cleopatra.

- 3. Answer any one of the following within 300 words: 10
 - (a) Discuss Millamant's quest for a stable marital relationship in *The Way of the World*.
 - (b) Give your assessment of the character of Mirabell.
 - (c) Examine the role of Demogorgon in Shelley's Prometheus Unbound.
 - (d) Consider *Prometheus Unbound* as a political allegory.
- 4. Comment on any *two* of the following (Each comment within 100 words): 5x2
 - (a) (i) 'All earthly things is but vanity'.

- (ii) Olente, lente, currite noctis equi.
- (b) (i) The choice of Venice as the setting of Volpone.

- (ii) The observance of the three Unities in All For Love.
- (c) (i) The metaphor of chase in The Way of the World.

(ii) Any one of the choric speeches in Prometheus Unbound.
