 - (c) Examine the importance of the wedding guest in *The Ancient Mariner*.

- (d) Kubla Khan is a poem about poetry and poetic creation. Discuss.
- 2. Answer any one of the following within 300 words: 10
 - (a) Examine Ode on Melancholy as an exploration of a mood in which joy is blended with melancholy.
 - (b) Comment on Keats's view of poetry as reflected in *The Fall of Hyperion: A Dream*.
 - (c) Analyse Tennyson's craftsmanship in *In Memoriam*.
 - (d) Would you agree with the view that In Memoriam is important not so much for the element of faith, as it is for the doubt?
- 3. Answer any one of the following within 300 words: 10
 - (a) How does Browning render effectively the artistic and moral subsidence of Andrea? Discuss.
 - (b) Consider Fra Lippo Lippi as a successful example of dramatic monologue.

- (c) Discuss the tension between the aesthetic perception and the ascetic vision in *The Windhover*.
- (d) Comment on the note of despair in Hopkins's 'terrible sonnets'.
- 4. Comment on any *two* of the following (Each comment within 100 words): 5×2
 - (a) (i) What dwelling shall receive me? in what vale Shall be my harbour?

- (ii) Instead of the cross, the Albatross About my neck was hung.
- (b) (i) She dwells with Beauty—Beauty that must die.

(ii) The marriage song as an epilogue in In Memoriam.
