13. Examine *The Love song of J. Alfred Prufrock* as an interior monologue. 16
14. Write a note on Auden's attitude to suffering as revealed in *Musee Des Beaux Arts*. 16
15. Evaluate Dylan Thomas's *A Refusal to Mourn the Death*, as an elegiac anti-elegy. 16
